## Plant Descriptions

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**Balsam Fir** - Native to NY & Canada. Needles are 3/4 to 1-1/2" long, dark and shiny green. It prefers well-drained soil and north and east slopes. Balsam Fir is widely used as Christmas trees.

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**Fraser Fir**- This evergreen is known to be an excellent Christmas tree, partly because the needles aren't nearly as sharp as a spruce. This tree prefers well drained soil.

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**Colorado Blue Spruce** - steel blue foliage. It prefers heavier soils with full sun. Trees will reach a height of six feet in eight years. This evergreen conifer is widely used in windbreaks when spaced 6 feet apart or as an ornamental yard tree.

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**American Hazelnut**- American hazelnut is a multi-stemmed shrub with a rounded habit, maturing at 6 to 10 feet high and 4 to 6 feet wide. Showy male flowers (catkins) add early spring interest, dark green leaves turn a beautiful kaleidoscope of colors in the fall. The nuts mature from September to October, attracting seed-eating birds, such as blue jays and woodpeckers.

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**Elderberry** - Elderberry is a large multi-stemmed, native shrub with showy white flower clusters in mid-summer followed by clusters of purple-black, berry-like fruit (drupe) at end of branches. Juice is used to make jams, jellies and wine. Plants are best used for naturalizing or as a back of the border hedge.

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**Highbush Cranberry** - Highbush cranberry plants are showy in spring when the flowers bloom against a backdrop of lush, dark green foliage. These plants take center stage again in fall when they are loaded with bright red or orange berries that hang from stems like cherries. The American cranberry has tart, acidic fruit that is best served in jellies, jams, sauces and relishes.

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**Black Chokeberry** - Black chokeberry is a shrub with an upright, mounded habit that can grow to 8' tall and 5' wide. Small clusters of white flowers in spring are followed by glossy black fruit. The high-antioxidant fruit is used in baking and to make jams, jellies, syrup, tea, juice and wine. Fruit will persist into winter serving as a food source for birds and other wildlife if left unpicked.

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**Gooseberry "Pixwell"** - Unlike most gooseberries, Pixwell has very few thorns, making harvest a pleasure. It is rust and mildew resistant, has decorative burgundy fall leaf color, and produces pink-to-purple berries. One of the best for pies and jams! Ripens early-midseason and averages 4-5# yield per plant. Canes are vigorous and spreading, with a mature bush size of about 4' x 5'.

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**Highbush Blueberry - Duke** blueberry grows well in cooler climates and northern regions. It is known both for its early season fruit, which is large with a firm, crisp texture, and its high yield of berries. **Bluecrop** is one of the hardiest blueberries, withstanding -20 to -30 degrees F. Berries are resistant to cracking. Blue Crop is known for its consistent production. Mature at 5-6 feet with a 5-6' spread.

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**Red Raspberry "Latham"** - Firm berries provide durability during harvest. Adapts well to a range of soil types. Upright growth habit. Burgundy fall foliage adds landscape interest. Fruit is outstanding for fresh-eating, freezing, and canning. Cold-hardy. Ripens in mid July. Self-pollinating.

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**Macoun Apple** - Delightful as an eating apple, these little gems have dark red skin with a purply blush, firm snow white flesh, a perfectly balanced bite between sweet and tart. The Macoun apple tree is not self fertile. Two popular apple trees that will work well are the Honeycrisp and Golden Delicious.

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**Honeycrisp Apple** - The Honeycrisp apple is a high quality apple which keeps well. The tree is one of the most vigorous and hardy of apple trees, showing little damage at -40 degrees. Honeycrisp fruit is characterized by an exceptionally crisp and juicy texture.

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**Contender Peach** - The Contender peach is known for being cold-hardy and disease resistance. The yellow flesh is perfect for eating fresh, canning, or freezing. It is a freestone peach meaning the flesh separates easily from the pit. These fruit trees need full sun and well-drained soil. To produce the best fruit, peach trees should be pruned, and the fruit should be thinned.

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**Stella Cherry** - A large, plump, deep-red cherry, the Stella Cherry is sweet, juicy and firm. It is a great cherry for fresh eating, canning, freezing and drying. This very productive self-pollinating tree will give you cherries in mid-June, but also is a great pollinator for other sweet cherry tree varieties.

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
